

## Introduction

The Wood County Park District was established in 1934 in accordance with the Ohio Revised Code, Chapter 1545 and is governed by a three member Board of Park Commissioners.

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When the Park District was established in 1934, it operated at a subsistence level for most of the past fifty years. Although this level of operation may have been satisfactory for many of those years, due mainly to the rural character of Wood County, people began to realize in the 1980's that the existing parks were in jeopardy of becoming unusable, and that the possibility for change in the rural landscape was growing. Therefore, in order to save the existing parks and provide opportunities for new parks, a levy was passed by the voters of Wood County in May of 1988.

The original Park District Strategic Plan entitled *Vision for the Future* was established in 1997 in advance of a replacement park levy passed by the voters in May, 1998. This strategic plan document assisted the Park District in park planning as well as preparation for the levy and gave insight into the needs of the Park District and funding necessary to complete the assigned goals.

The present Park District levy has provided excellent opportunity for growth in the addition of park lands and passive recreational facilities for Wood County citizens. With this current 10-year park levy due to expire at the end of 2008, the Board of Park Commissioners initiated an update to the strategic plan in order to continue forward thinking and planning for the future. The future of Wood County will involve many changes related to the development of land. As a natural resource based park agency, the Park District will continue to play a role in the future land use in Wood County. In addition, the Wood County Park District continues to strive to meet the needs of the citizens by providing quality passive recreational opportunities and facilities for their continued enjoyment.

This update to the Wood County Park District's *Vision for the Future* will again assist in planning for the future by guiding the continued growth and development of the Park District. In addition, this plan will assist in establishing adequate funding levels for the continued success of the Park District, based on needs identified by the public served.

## **Mission Statement**

The mission of the Wood County Park District is to preserve, enhance, protect, and interpret the natural and cultural resources of Wood County while providing quality passive recreational and educational opportunities for present and future Wood County Citizens.

## **Vision Statement**

The levy that was passed to support the Wood County Park District in 1988 was based on a dream. This dream was founded on the idea of greater access to quality recreational facilities for the citizens of Wood County through the rejuvenation of existing parks and opportunities for new parks by the preservation of unique natural areas. The replacement levy passed by Wood County voters in 1998 was an affirmation of that dream; a recommitment to the mission of the Park District. Many parts of this dream are now a reality. At the same time, because the mission of the Park District is based on the preservation of natural areas, additional opportunities and challenges exist that if not addressed within the next ten years, will be lost.

Wood County has a wealth of natural, cultural, and historic resources that make it a truly unique place to live. It is in the middle of what was the Great Black Swamp with its expanses of wetlands, swamp woods, and prairies. Its rivers, the Maumee and the Portage, are naturally and historically significant in terms of local and national settlement. Its level, rich land is very desirable for agriculture as well as construction. Changes in the Wood County landscape are inevitable and are occurring at an increasing rate. The Wood County Park District must be prepared to play a role in this change.

The Wood County Park District seeks to play a leadership role in the preservation of natural areas and the provision of quality passive park facilities and opportunities for the citizens of Wood County. This leadership will stem from being able to take a proactive approach to land preservation from working with Wood County citizens, organizations, and governments to plan for the future quality of life, and from maintaining high standards for park facilities. The Park District will: (1) work to ensure an adequate financial base to support park maintenance, land acquisition, capital improvements, and all other park operations; (2) develop an active strategy to increase citizen awareness of the Park District and participation in educational and planning efforts; and (3) place greater emphasis on citizen education in terms of stewardship and the conservation of natural resources. The Park District is committed to the preservation of the Wood County's natural heritage for the benefit of future generations.

## **The Planning Process**

The original Strategic Plan was created in 1997 through a process that included many people over the course of twelve meetings. Upon approval to proceed with this planning process, a ten-member planning committee was selected which included the three members of the Board of Park Commissioners, two members of the Park District staff, and five citizen members. In addition, a plan facilitator was selected. The primary role of this facilitator was to promote fair and open discussion at all meetings and to provide technical and editorial assistance to the Park District staff during the writing of the strategic plan document.

The process of updating this plan involved the use of the Park District Strategic Team. This three-member team of Park District management staff was established in 2000, with the exclusive function of monitoring the strategic goals of the Park District and insuring the continued progress in meeting these goals. Once again, an outside facilitator was involved in guiding the process. The facilitator served as a moderator for all public meetings and as a resource for the dissemination and interpretation of information gained in the meetings as well as editorial assistance in the writing of the updated plan document.

In order to gain the insight of Wood County citizens, a series of five town-meeting style discussions were held across the county. These meetings were held at William Henry Harrison Park, Otsego Park, the W.W. Knight Preserve, the Bowling Green Public Library, and the North Baltimore Public Library. These locations were selected in order to provide as many opportunities as possible for citizens to attend and share their thoughts through regional meetings utilizing Park District facilities whenever possible. These discussion sessions began with a short presentation outlining the current strategic plan and the accomplishments of the Park District in meeting the goals established in this plan. This was followed by discussion during which meeting attendees were asked to share their views on the Park District in the form of current strengths of the Park District and opportunities for expanded services. These discussion points were recorded by category on large paper. At the conclusion of each meeting the participants were asked to rate the top three issues under each category.

The final process involved gaining input from the Park District staff. The same process was used for the staff meeting as was used for the town meetings. These public and staff responses as well as much detailed information regarding the operation of the Park District were reviewed and discussed by the Park District strategic team and the plan facilitator. From this information, the basic recommendations and future goals of the Park District were created. From that point, the strategic team under the guidance of the plan facilitator wrote the plan

document. The strategic team then met with each of the three members of the Board of Park Commissioners independently to present them the proposed plan for their comment and feedback. After input from the Board, they were presented with this plan for their approval.

## **Departmental Mission Statements and Summaries**

### **Administrative Department**

Present staffing: 3 full-time; 1 part-time

### **Naturalist Program Department**

*Mission Statement: To support the preservation, protection, and enhancement of Wood County's natural resources through interpretation and education with hands-on, non-consumptive activities, events, and programs.*

As interpreters the naturalist program department helps to form connections between the citizens of Wood County and their surroundings, be it natural or cultural, that result in a better appreciation of and therefore stewardship of a resource.

Present staffing: 2 Full-time; 1 part-time

### **Operations Department**

*Mission Statement: To provide the public with safe, clean, quality parklands and facilities through professional and environmentally conscious work practices.*

Present Staffing: 4 full-time; 4 part-time; 5 seasonals

## **Ranger Department**

*Mission Statement: To protect and serve while providing community leadership by developing crime prevention partnerships.*

Present staffing: 6 full-time

## **Stewardship Department**

*Mission Statement: To provide the sound management of our area's natural resources on behalf of the community and the Wood County Park District.*

The Stewardship Department coordinates propagation and planting for park lands. This may involve seed collecting and cleaning, plant cultivation, transplanting, and maintenance. Many of the gardens in the parks and around Park District facilities have vegetation grown by the Stewardship Department in their greenhouse and planted and maintained by the department and its many wonderful volunteers.

Present staffing: 1 full-time; 1 part-time

## **Areas of Emphasis**

### **Preservation**

Continued planning and funding for property acquisition using current land acquisition principles 1) land to be acquired should have unique natural characteristics; river frontage/riparian, woods, prairie, wetland, etc. 2) Acquisition of land adjacent to existing park district facilities 3) acquisition of land of significant size; 100 acres and above 4) land under eminent development pressure that fits any of the above qualifications.

Develop a prioritized list of desirable land. Work to develop a positive relationship with landowners in these areas in order to foster future acquisitions.

Develop a strategic land acquisition plan targeting specific sensitive/important land areas.

Investigate the possibilities of acquiring the former France Stone Quarry, located west of the village of North Baltimore, and other properties in the area. Incorporate public input to assist with planning and development as a recreation area.

Strive for clean, safe, and maintained facilities through continued development and ongoing evaluation of park maintenance standards.

Work with appropriate partners to develop bike routes connecting parks and other points of interest as well as potential new bike facilities in and around Wood County.

Continue working with North Coast Regional Council of Park Districts in researching wetland mitigation and other alternative funding sources.

Collaborate with outside organizations such as Black Swamp Conservancy, Farm Bureau, and Trust for Public Lands to work towards not only preservation of natural areas but also farmland.

Continue stewardship of natural areas which would include native wood county landscapes and the propagation of rare, threatened, endangered, and extirpated flora as well as the control of non-native species.

Explore the potential for utilizing alternative energy sources for future and current Park District facilities.

The Park District should create a written management plan for each of its parks in order to address specific management objectives and activities.

### **Passive Recreation**

Continue park development plans for each park working towards a Park District Master Plan. During this process the Park District must continue to plan for new and existing facilities in ways that encourage high quality with low maintenance.

Rental facilities should be operated on a break-even basis. Routinely evaluate facility rental fees to insure that the fees are in line with utility and other operational costs.

Insure that adequate financial resources are available for implementation of park capital improvement projects.

Prioritized development considerations will be given to already existing park properties; these include Cedar Creeks Preserve, Carter-Loomis Farm Park, Bradner Preserve, Beaver Creek Preserve, and various Slippery Elm Trail areas (*see Appendix A*).

Within the park planning process passive recreational opportunities will be explored dependent upon the park specific resources available. New opportunities for already existing parks will also be explored while attempting to create specific destination parks throughout the county. Specific items noted in strategic planning meetings include: interpretive signage on trails, sled hills, skating, paved trails where appropriate, water recreation, camping, cabins, shelters, boating, hunting, fishing, playgrounds, cross country skiing, and restroom facilities.

Park District will research the possibility of establishing outdoor sporting opportunities which would include field training area for sporting dogs, archery, and clay courses in conjunction with other interested organizations.

Continue canoe livery and research expansion opportunities.

Continue and expand fishing opportunities, and investigate potential for pond construction in various parks.

Continue to investigate outside grant and funding sources for capital improvements, park development, and educational programming.

## **Education**

### General

Continue to explore and collaborate with outside agencies and experts to provide quality educational programs and other opportunities such as adopt-a-garden, adopt-a-trail, and exhibits.

Work with local solid waste district to provide recycling opportunities in parks.

Work with BGSU to educate incoming students on the various opportunities in the Wood County Parks.

Continue to create park specific brochures highlighting opportunities as well as brochures focusing on the various plants and animals that reside in the parks.

Continue and expand advertising of public and request programs as well as other park related opportunities

Continue to offer programs that target specific audiences; children, seniors, and home schooled children.

Continue development and ongoing evaluation of the Park District webpage and online reservation system. Continue to utilize technology as it becomes available.

### Naturalist

Continue to provide quality and innovative educational programming on cultural and natural resources present in Wood County and the surrounding region. Specific items mentioned in strategic planning meetings include programs on prairies, pond maintenance, birds, geology, native plants, astronomy, local history, living history programs at appropriate parks, gardening, hands-on, sustainable/green practices, animals, and multigenerational programming.

Explore possibilities for partnering with organizations currently offering teas such as the Wood County Historical Center.

Continue to work with schools throughout Wood County to provide educational opportunities that meet curriculum guidelines. An emphasis will be placed on having schools visit park properties and facilities whenever possible.

Continue to develop yearly exhibits to be held at the Nature Center at W.W. Knight Nature Preserve.

#### Stewardship

Continue to provide quality natural areas stewardship outreach education on topics such as vermicomposting, invasive species control, pest management, and the use of native plants.

#### Ranger

Rangers will continue to provide outreach programs such as bike safety, hunter education, and ride with a ranger, fishing, and fitness.

Continue community policing efforts by rangers including open communication with park neighbors.

#### **Other**

Continue and expand local park grant improvement program. Throughout the next ten years the program will be increased from its current \$75,000/year to \$100,000/year. In conjunction, continue public awareness of the Park District's local park improvement grant program.

Investigate the possibilities of relocating Park District Headquarters into an existing park.

Continue to improve marketing of the Park District to improve public awareness by establishing an effective marketing plan that will successfully promote the Park District to the public we serve.

Continue public outreach to insure public input and support.

Recruit and retain an active Park District volunteer base.

Continue to provide and investigate new opportunities for community centered events.

Research possibilities for surveying park users to obtain valuable community input.

Continue to provide safe parks by continued law enforcement patrol.

### Staffing

Insure that adequate financial resources are available to employ and retain quality staff. Conduct a wage survey to insure that employees are adequately compensated in comparison to other county employees.

Insure staffing is at a proper level in all departments to insure the ability to carry out the mission of the Wood County Park District as well as the strategic plan.

The following are projected staffing additions:

#### Administrative

Convert the part-time administrative assistant position into a full-time position in 2009.

#### Naturalist Program Department

Convert the part-time naturalist position into a full-time position in 2009.

Add one (1) part-time naturalist for the purpose of staffing the Carter-Loomis Farm Park in 2012.

#### Operations Department

Add one (1) full-time maintenance specialist in 2009 and one (1) additional in 2012.

#### Stewardship Department

Add one (1) full-time stewardship specialist and one (1) permanent part-time specialist in 2009.

The Park District has offered training and educational opportunities to staff members in terms of safety, supervisory

skills, ranger skills, professional development, and technical training. This emphasis on staff training should be continued in order to ensure that employees are knowledgeable and effective.

## Park Operations

When developing parks the 5-M plan, as described by Lisa Brochu in “Interpretive Planning” will be used. In this plan, architectural site and operational issues will be considered in addition to providing details about the overall interpretive or education program, thematic guidelines, cost projections for development and implementation, and media descriptions that match selected media to audiences and objectives (Brochu, 2003, p. 6).

Continue partnership with the Wood County Historical Society and the Wood County Historical Center with representation on the Historical Society Board. The Park District will continue to manage and maintain the grounds of the Wood County Historical Center and partner on the development of the grounds based on the historical society’s site plan.

Continue ongoing maintenance of the Slippery Elm Trail including trail upkeep, seal coating, resurfacing, and added cut-backs at intersections to allow for proper line of sight.

Continue operational practices using the district format and making changes in accordance with regional growth.

Develop and maintain a prioritized list of equipment that includes a need rating and the possible means of acquisition (borrowing from another agencies, rental, joint ownership, or direct purchase).

Continue to incorporate all equipment in a regular preventive maintenance program to ensure maximum use.

Develop a depreciation program for major equipment to provide for adequate replacement and to determine trade-in value.

## FWCP

Work in conjunction with the FWCP to increase membership.

Work in conjunction with the FWCP to target specific fundraising activities and goals to further the mission of the FWCP and the Park District.

Continue collaboration with FWCP to develop and evaluate the volunteer program to insure adequate volunteers for the FWCP and their support of Park District activities.

# Appendix A-

Following is an outline of the planned Capital Improvement projects of the first five years of the proposed levy.

## Cedar Creek Preserve

In 2009, the plan for Cedar Creek is to install all utilities, water, sewer, electric, and gas. Within the same given year, the plan is for construction of a restroom facility with service room, asphalt paving of the existing stone parking lot and the change of use of the eight acres of unmanaged grassland lying between the northern border and the entrance drive of the park into managed turf. This area would be large enough to accommodate outdoor activities such as soccer, baseball, etc. It will be the intention of the Park District to enter into a synergistic relationship with a local youth sport association much like the relationship agreement with our Buttonwood soccer fields and the Perrysburg Youth Soccer Association.

Within the first five years of the new levy, two shelter houses that can accommodate 75 people will be constructed on the north side of the parking lot; one shelter on each side of the restroom facility. In addition, a composite playground with safety surfacing will be added with design features that allow for future addition to be easily added.

In addition, the trail system will be expanded and be upgraded to handicap accessible trail system by providing a compact stone surfacing. The trail system will include the construction of a second bridge to cross Cedar Creek to complete a loop trail system.

# Bradner Preserve

In 2009, the plan for Brander Preserve will be the addition of a primitive campground with service drive; improvements to existing trails by installing a boardwalk in low lying areas, and the extension plan of the woods trail system.

Due to growing interest, the Park District is exploring the feasibility of ATV trails within our park system. The 50-acre parcel of wooded land west of Timmons road would be well suited for this type of activity. The remains of the old schoolhouse demolition material have already disturbed the area, and the property had a history for ATV activity prior to Park District acquisition. Throughout our state, there is a growing demand for this type of outdoor sport. The Park District has an opportunity to address this demand by providing land for the trails and this serve a new group of outdoor enthusiasts previously not reached.

If the park District were to provide such trail system the model of our state off-road vehicle trails program, the park district would require riders to register their ATV's with the Bureau of Motor Vehicles and acquire a Park District permit. All state rules and regulations for the safe operation of these vehicles would be adopted. The Park District would also seek a group or club sponsorship to help manage this site. A suitable location would be chosen, separate from other activities to minimize any disturbance and use conflict.

With in the first five years of the levy additional capital project will include the construction of an access drive and 10 car parking area at the northern park entrance, 12 X 18ft. open picnic shelter, playground structure and composting toilet facility.

Other park improvements with in the ten year levy will include excavation of wetland and vernal pools, seeding and reconstruction of native prairie, boardwalk through wetland and construction of multipurpose program building.

## **Carter Loomis Farm Park**

In 2011, the second year of our levy, the Park District's capital plan is to install a 20-car stone surfaced parking lot. The lot will be located at the northeast portions of the farm park and will be accessed off Simonds Road. Other improvements to the park will be the complete foundation replacement of the north and east sides of the main barn. Similar repairs were made to the south side of the barn in 2005, and this project will complete the foundation restoration of the main barn. Our focus will be to continue to repair structural deficiencies in the smaller outbuildings and work will begin on the period restoration of the farmhouse.

After the completion of the parking lot and barn restoration interpretive programs and larger events such as harvest festival, and spring on the farm festival will begin.

Other capital project to be completed or in progress within the first five years are:

### Interpretive Trail-

- a trail system that begins at the northwest corner of the barnyard and extends through the woodlot. The trail will include a portion of a corduroy road, period farming techniques, and 3-D interpretive media.

### Period restoration of farm house.

- Both interior and exterior

### Parking Lot and Drive Construction

### Main Barn and Out Building Repairs

- Foundation repairs, approximately 45 ft. of north wall and 40 feet of the east wall will need to be removed and replaced including the sill beam.

## **Slippery Elm Trail**

Trail repair and resurfacing; although our trail is in relatively good condition for its age, the service life expectancy of the surface materials is around twenty to twenty five years. The Park District has been diligent and proactive with our maintenance practices on the Slippery Elm Trail and the need for future repair is inevitable.

Continued preventative maintenance will be practiced and will include seal coating of the entire trail. Repaving will be performed in areas that are deemed necessary.

## **Cricket Frog Cove**

This is a 160-acre park located in the south central part of the county. The strategic plan for this park is still in the development process; however, access and parking lot are currently in place, but restroom and shelter facilities are needed. The park is currently used for nature programming and hunting. The park has both a large woods and open prairie 40-acres of which has been restored and managed by the Park District.

Due to the deed restrictions, the land use and structures that can be erected on the property are limited; however, the site is well suited to hold large outdoor events that do not require large support infrastructure. During the strategic planning process, an interest in outdoor sports such as clay course and game trail shoots was repeatedly expressed. It will be in the interest to the Park District to establish a relationship with local sporting groups to help sponsor and manage such events.

Other improvements to the site will include the construction of a trail system that accesses both the woods and prairies of the park and will include elevated boardwalk in low lying areas.

## **Beaver Creek Preserve**

This park currently has limited public access and is primarily used by the program staff for astronomy programs. Site amenities requiring repair are the telescope mounting platform and its observation deck, the telescope housing shed. Also on site is the Barker Retreat, which currently is in preparation to be used as a rental facility. However, other park improvements must be implemented before the Barker retreat will be open to the public.

## **William Henry Harrison**

Starting in 2011, the construction of a 12 X 18 foot open shelter will be located between the restroom building and the open field. In addition, the rehabilitation and enclosure of the current open shelter will begin. The open shelter has a very low daily or weekly public use, and when it is used it is usually a small group of three to six people at a time. The enclosure of the open shelter will allow an additional reservable facility able to accommodate 75 people at Harrison Park. An additional parking area will also be constructed to accommodate the increased traffic and visitation to the park. Other park improvements will include adding additional playground equipment and expanding the existing playground.
